FIRST TIME SINCE 1793 New Section Of Woodchester

Roman Pavement Uncovered

DURING the past few weeks work has been going on at Woodchester on the site of the Roman Villa and several tesselated floors, last uncovered nearly 200 years ago, have been exposed and will be on view to the public for two weeks from July 26th.

Using the authoritative book compiled by Samuel Lysons when he first excavated the whole extent of the Villa in 1793, villagers, under the watchful eye of the rector (Rev. H. D. Woolcott), have been measuring and digging to a depth of about three feet in the grounds of the Old Priory.

The hard work involved has been well worth while as the floors have been found in almost identical condition to what they must have been when Lysons plotted them.

As the pavements now revealed are those in side rooms they are not of equal merit to the great Orpheus payement in the main hall for which l Woodchester is so famous.
