## Curtain up on giant play plans

DOZENS of Stroud people have begun brushing up their acting skills with the first of a series of workshops leading to the town's mammoth community play.

More than 40 residents joined the inaugural drama session at organisers Dr Foster's New Mills rehearsal space off Slad Road.

And on Sunday 100 people will be singing there at the first musical workshop.

Camilla Hale, co-ordinator of the huge autumn play — expected to be seen by 7,000 people — said: "Everyone interested is welcome to come along when Pete Rosser will lead the session.
