FORMER Beatle Sir Paul McCartney will help re-open Stroud's revamped Subscription Rooms if a local pensioner has a little luck.

Joe Salt, 84, plans to ask the pop legend to open the prominent town centre building after discovering it was one of the first places where The Beatles performed a properly-promoted concert outside of Liver-

Mr Salt, of Weyhouse Close, said he disc roiginal Fab Four played a concert in the soubscription Rooms on March 31, 1962, to an a dience of more than 400, just before they became "nuge international

The Subscription Rooms building is undergoing a £600,000 revamp, which includes a storing the original double staircase, installing a lift to give disabled people access, upgrading the toilets and cafe and improving the acoustics.

Ceremony

Mr Salt said he thought it would be fitting for Sir Paul to cut the ribbon at the re-opening ceremony.

"They did a programme on The Beatles and men-tioned Stroud was one of the first places they had played in outside Liverpool so I thought it would be nice if Sir Paul McCartney could come to open it," said Mr Salt

"I rather like him and their music, although I must say I am 84 so I do not dance around to the music, but I think The Beatles were great.

"They charged £30 when they came the first time -I would think it would be a lot more this time."

And Bob Lusty, of Stonehouse, said he remembered the gig and even chatted to the band afterwards.

"It would be great if Paul McCartney came back to Stroud and I could meet him again," he added.

Dave Marshall, spokesman for Stroud District Council which owns the listed building, said it was considering asking Sir Paul to open the building.

"We think it is a good idea," he said. "The opening is likely to coincide with the Stroud Festival in September, so we will have to talk to the festival organisers and our own councillors, but it would be ganisers and our own councillors, but it would be great.
