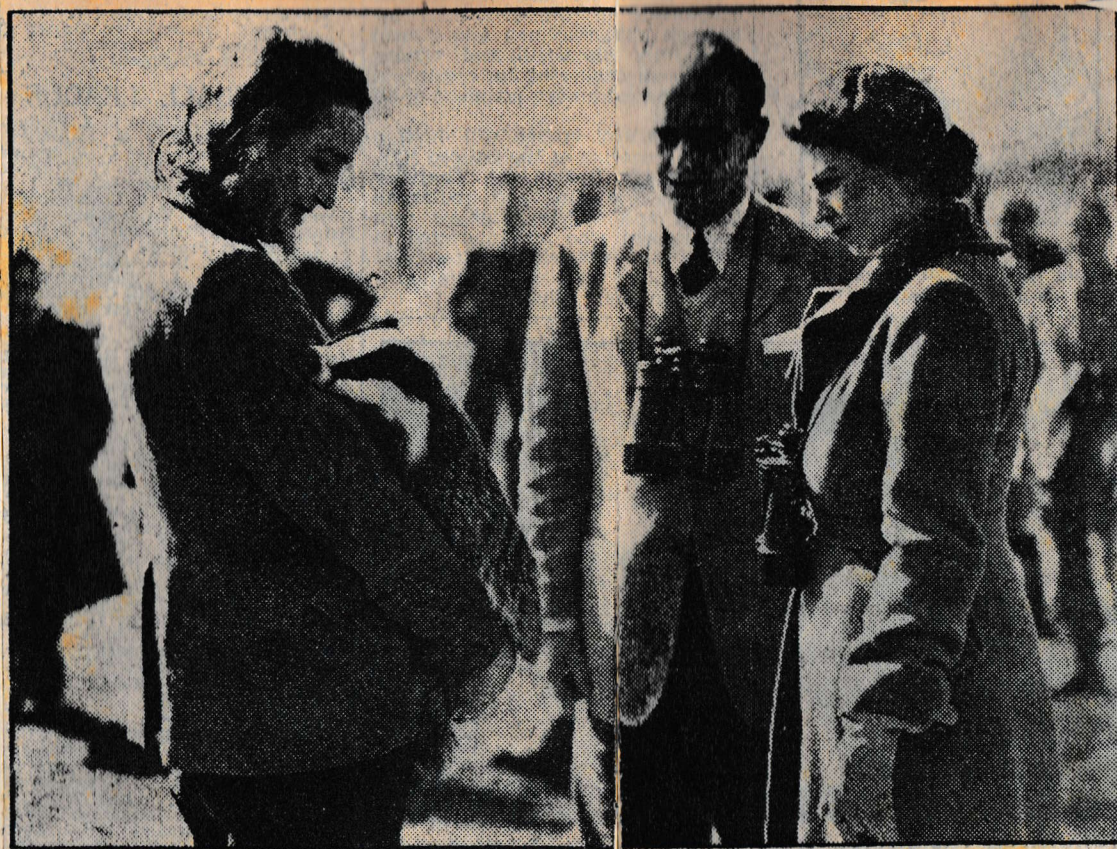


VISITORS' BOOK
